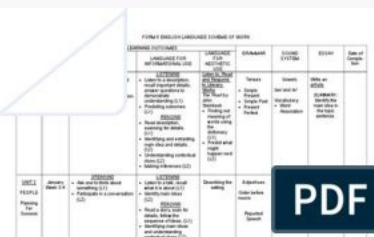

Preposition

A preposition is a part of speech that introduces a prepositional phrase in a sentence. "The cat sleeps on the sofa," the word "on" is a preposition, introducing the prepositional phrase "on the sofa". In English, the most used prepositions are "at", "in", "on", "for", and "to". Simply put, a preposition indicates a relation between things mentioned in a sentence. Linguists sometimes distinguish between a preposition, which precedes its phrase, a postposition, which follows its phrase, and as a rare case a circumposition, which surrounds its phrase. Taken together, the words are called adpositions. In more technical languages, an adpositional element that, morphologically, combines restrictively with a phrase that phrase should be interpreted in the surrounding context use the word "preposition" instead of "adposition" for all three. In linguistics, adpositions are considered to be members of the F₁ / PP₁ [2] consisting of an adpositional head and its complement used for a wide range of syntactic and semantic functions, most modification and complementation. Adpositions perform many of the same functions as case markings, but adpositions are syntactic elements, while case markings are morphological elements.
Definition
